OUR TOP TIPS FOR AN EARTH FRIENDLY 2021

- Avoid single use plastics when food shopping take reusable produce bags and choose plastic free options
- 2. Place a 'No Junk Mail' sign on your letterbox
- 3. Invest in reusable takeaway items e.g. water bottle, lunch box, cutlery, straw, coffee cup
- 4. Try your hand at zero waste gift wrapping, such as 'Furoshiki' fabric wrapping or reusable boxes and bags
- 5. Purchase items second hand and get to know your local op shop!
- 6. Invest in a reusable metal safety razor
- 7. Join your local 'Buy Nothing' group on Facebook
- 8. Compost food scraps through your lime green lidded FOGO bin, a home compost, bokashi bin or worm farm
- 9. Invest in stainless steel pegs that will last a lifetime!
- 10. Support local sustainable businesses such as your local bulk food store or low waste cafe
- 11. Switch to bamboo toothbrushes
- 12. Reuse what you already have, often the most sustainable option is the one you already own
- 13. Swap to shampoo/conditioner/soap bars or refill liquid soaps from your local bulk store
- 14. Download the Recycle Right app!

Be a GREAT Sort!

WA is filled with **GREAT** sorts who put less in their bins. Before throwing something away, **GREAT** sorts consider if it can be **G**ifted, **R**ecycled, **E**arth-cycled, **A**voided or **T**aken to a special drop-off point.

Remember to take hazardous items such as used batteries, light globes and unwanted electronic items to special drop off centres so that they can be recycled safely. Be a GREAT sort and use landfill as the last resort.

Our Recycle Right member, the City of Canning, has launched a fun, new campaign featuring its newest waste team member, Bindi the Australian White Ibis.

Bindi was drawn by a local artist and named by Canning resident Chloe in a City-wide competition.

Chloe said: "as bindi bindi means butterfly in Noongar language, it also represents the transformative potential of our waste if we reuse and recycle. Bindi loves to rethink waste as potential and help prevent stuff ending up in the tip."

The first focus area of the City's nine-month campaign is 'wash it before you toss it,' encouraging residents to rinse their jars, containers, tins and bottles before placing them in the recycling bin.

Those living in or visiting Canning will be seeing Bindi on the City's waste and recycling trucks, across social media and outdoor signage, so keep an eye out!
